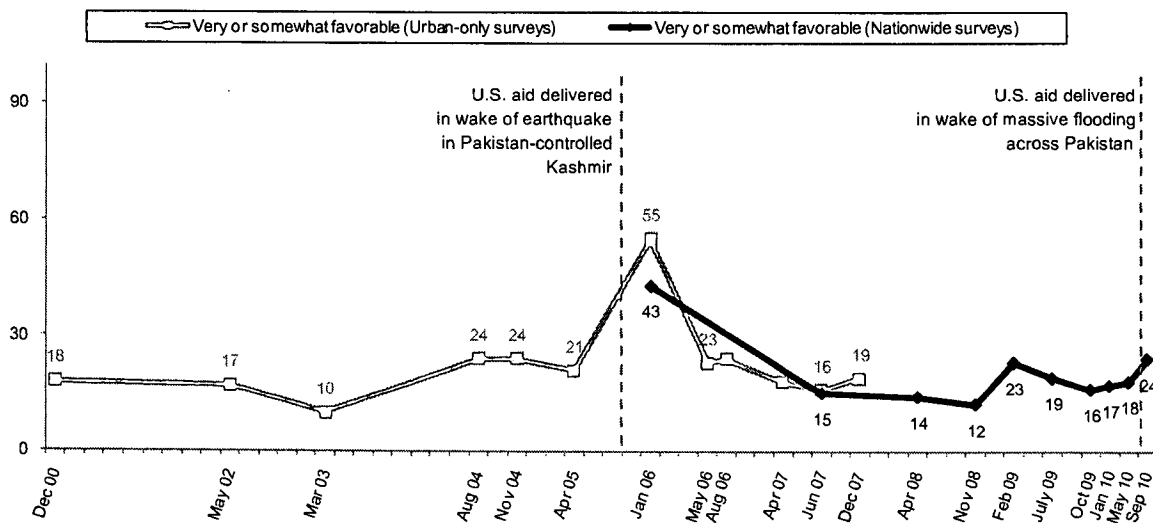

New Public Opinion Survey Findings from Pakistan
Office of Opinion Research, U.S. Department of State

- In a September 2010 Office of Opinion Research survey of Pakistan's four provinces fielded after floodwaters swept the country and the U.S. pledged over \$350 million in relief aid, twenty-four percent express a favorable opinion of the United States, up six points compared to May.

- The Pakistani public is broadly aware of foreign assistance pledged to those affected by the August floods, particularly aid from the United States, China and Saudi Arabia.
 - When asked about each country separately, two-thirds or more say the United States (66%), China (79%) and Saudi Arabia (84%) have provided "a great deal" or "a fair amount" of assistance to Pakistanis affected by flooding (see Survey Findings, Page 2 of 2).
 - When asked what one foreign country is doing the most to aid those affected by flooding, Pakistanis are most likely to name Saudi Arabia (45%). The United States (18%) and China (18%) tie for a distant second (see below).
