You have so many friends and admirers here in the Twin Cities, and there is so much good work being done here on public issues of concern to you. For these reasons, I thought I'd take the liberty of asking whether we could present to you the Humphrey School of Public Affairs Public Leadership Award at a Minneapolis event sometime next April, at a specific date we could determine that suits your schedule.

The Humphrey School's Public Leadership Awards Dinner is one of the most prominent nationally focused public affairs events in the Twin Cities, with participation of many hundreds of leaders from the local community, the state and the region. Previous Award recipients have included George Mitchell, Madeleine Albright, and Lee Hamilton, among others. It has served not only to honor individuals of great distinction, but also to enhance the connections between the Twin Cities and the world of policy on national and global issues. In addition, proceeds from the event have served as a major source of scholarship support for our public affairs students, a large percentage of whom are of modest means -- and many are among the first in their families to have attended college.
